Bullying Definition

Bullying is defined as any severe or pervasive physical or verbal act or conduct, including communications made in writing or electronically, directed toward a student or students that has or can be reasonably predicted to place the student in fear of harm, causes a detrimental effect on their physical or mental health, interferes with academic performance, and interferes with a student's ability to participate in activities at school.

Our policy and training utilize nationally recognized standards

Britten School utilizes a three-tier framework evidence based public health approach to bullying prevention. In **Tier-I**, we focus on school-wide precautions, including a school-wide Bullying Prevention Assembly, No Bullying Pledge Days, and utilizing the Positive Actions social skills curriculum. In **Tier-Two**, we focus on small group intervention, possible changes in classroom placement, possible student mediation, and additional bus supervision. In **Tier 3**, we focus on individualized interventions working with students who have a history of bullying behaviors and/or have been bullied.

We want to know

There is a designated mailbox in the main school office where students can anonymously write any concerns of bullying that they may have. All faculty will be responsible for receiving verbal and/or written reports of alleged bullying from parents/guardians, faculty, adults, and students. They are then required to immediately inform Administration of any perceived bullying or targeted incident that is witnessed or verbally reported by parents/guardians, other faculty, adults or students. At all times, we will strive to maintain student safety and fairness and will investigate allegations, recommend services, and mediate when appropriate in accordance with State Regulations and Best Practice Standards.

We encourage parent involvement and provide annual training

Faculty, students, and parents will receive access to the Britten School Bullying Prevention Policy through annual training of faculty, on the website, and fact sheet at registration. Parents/Guardians are encouraged to make us aware of any concerns that they may have regarding their student. Britten School will provide an annual overview on the Positive Actions/Pasela Curriculum, and the Britten School Bullying Prevention Policy at Parent Open House Night.
